

Rob's Ruminations

Koinonia = Community

A friend of mine shared the following quote from an email from the Society of St. John's the Evangelist in Cambridge, MA and I thought that it very accurately described what we are trying to do and be here at St. John's.

"Koinonia

When the New Testament talks about coming to faith in Christ, it is always in terms of community. The way to grow into our full stature as children of God is not through competitive individualism, but being made part of a new family, a fellowship, or what the New Testament calls a "koinonia" of love. It is in this community, the Church, the Body of Christ, that we become who we most truly are meant to be, and gain our true identity." -Br. Geoffrey Tristram

I see this in action just about everyday that I spend in and around St. John's. Community is not just a place, but also a practice. Whether it is on a Sunday morning listening to our children's choirs sing that brings a majority of the congregation to tears, or the simple care of a friend acquiring and delivering a Book of Common Prayer to a friend who can no longer make it to church. There are examples all around us...if we slow down and pay attention. It is this practice of Community or Koinonia that is at the heart of the phrase that I say when the teenagers have a Service Sunday. I say, "They are skipping church to BE the church." The world needs churches to be more than simply a place. The world needs the church to BE about action. To Practice what we preach and as the General Thanksgiving from the service of Morning Prayers so clearly and beautifully states, "that we show forth thy praise, not only with our lips, but in our lives." (BCP pg. 59)

In this month that has Thanksgiving and Gratitude at its core I will be giving thanks that I am a part of a wonderfully imperfect community that seeks to find God not only in the transcendent, but also in the normal, ordinary everyday that is most of our existence. That we do not set ourselves above or even apart, but rather that we seek to find God, meaning and goodness together in a holy practice of Koinonia.

"Church is a crazy concept" a friend of mine said recently..."Yes it is" I replied "and I wouldn't trade it for the world." Thank you for being Church, being Community, being Koinonia with and for me.

Associate Rector's Reflections

The Gift of Sabbath

"In returning and rest you shall be saved; In quietness and confidence shall be your strength."

-Isaiah 30:15

Every October the Episcopal clergy in New Hampshire are invited to attend a two day gathering. Over the last six years, these have been structured as conferences but this year, we were blessed with a retreat, offered by Brother David Vryhof, SSJE. What a gift! The theme of the retreat was 'Resting in God: The Spiritual Practice of Keeping Sabbath'. Back in July, we heard in the Gospel of Mark the invitation from Jesus to his disciples: 'Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest awhile'. I shared with you my experiences in New Zealand of being on retreat and the blessing of taking time not only to rest but to connect with God in a deeper way.

The biblical warrant for Sabbath rest with which we are most familiar is found in the 10 Commandments – Exodus 20:8-11 (the fourth commandment and the longest one!). We are to keep the Sabbath holy following the creation pattern of God's six days of work and rest on the seventh day. In the restatement of the Commandments in Deuteronomy 5:12-15, it is that freedom from slavery in Egypt, where there was no rest for the Israelites, just relentless work, that calls the people of God to observe the Sabbath so that they are never again enslaved by work.

We need Sabbath and it is God's gift to us just as it was to the Israelites as they came out of captivity in Egypt. The poet Wendell Berry suggests 'Sabbath observance invites us to stop. It invites us to rest. It asks us to notice that while we rest, the world continues without our help. It invites us to delight in the world's beauty and abundance.' Berry has his own Sabbath practice – a walk in nature and the writing of a poem. One of his Sabbath poem books, The Timbered Choir, is delightful and challenging. A favorite poem of mine is 'The Peace of Wild Things':

*When despair grows in me
and I wake in the night at the least sound
in fear of what my life and my children's lives may be,
I go and lie down where the wood drake
rests in his beauty on the water, and the great heron feeds.
I come into the peace of wild things
who do not tax their lives with forethought
of grief. I come into the presence of still water.
And I feel above me the day-blind stars
waiting for their light. For a time
I rest in the grace of the world, and am free.*

As we considered what Sabbath rest might be for us, Brother David offered both thoughts on what we might rest *from* and what we might rest *for*.

We were invited to rest from working (despite the fact our society values work, not rest), to rest from producing and accomplishing (we are loved by God not for what we do but for who we are – uniquely created in God), to rest from worrying (!), to rest from acquiring (rather than seeking more, to reflect on being good stewards of what we have already been given), to rest from trying to be God (rather than thinking we are in charge, in control, resting with hope and confidence in God's love and provision.) and rest from living a mindless, meaningless routine (noticing and appreciating the world around us, the people in our lives, 'stopping to smell the roses'). Brother David asked 'what we are resting *for*? What might help us find rest and refreshment?'. He offered seven practices: Worship (connecting, being mindful of God), rest (thinking about what is restful for you – it is not one size fits all!), reflection (time to consider our relationships, our values, the way we walk in the world), renewal (tending body, mind and spirit), beauty (enjoying God's creation, whether in nature, an art museum, reading a good book), being with people (taking time to be with others, in worship, in companionship, enjoying life together) and stillness (finding peace, both within and without).

Practicing Sabbath is harder I think when our lives are ordered in such a way that there is not a single day of the week for the observance, when different folks find different days of the week for their Sabbath. The brothers of the Society of St. John the Evangelist have Monday as their Sabbath – there are no public services or guests in the Guest Houses on Mondays. Monday is the day I try to take as my Sabbath, with limited success! Rob and Nathan try to take Friday as their Sabbath.

I invite you to ponder what it means to you to rest, do you find time and space to rest? What practicing Sabbath might look like in your life. And remember the words of Jesus: 'Come to me, all you that are weary and carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest.' Matthew 11:28

God and the Ballot

They were greatly astounded and said to one another, "Then who can be saved?" Jesus looked at them and said, "For mortals it is impossible, but not for God; for God all things are possible." –Mark 10:26-27

In case you haven't noticed, there's an election coming up. Yard signs are popping up like crocuses after a thaw. My mailbox is filled with glossy photos, catchphrases, and claims of how the other candidate wants to rob the elderly, harm our children, or take away your money that you've worked hard to earn. I can't listen to the news without hearing clips of another political rally or speculation about a race that's too close to call.

Last month Tim Keller, a Presbyterian pastor wrote an article for the New York Times exploring how Christians fit—or, as he concludes, don't fit—into our country's two-party system. His writing focuses on party allegiance, but at its heart is about a larger question. Should the church—both the institution and the people it comprises—be political? And if so, how? These are important questions for every church community to wrestle with, especially around election time, when discussions of politics and issues that affect all of our lives can feel more fraught.

A couple months ago someone asked me how a Christian view of human flourishing differs from that of either major political party. I had to think about how I would articulate an answer and put my gut reaction into words. What I came to is this—I believe without a doubt that Christians are called to be political. We don't have a choice. As Keller points out in his article—"Those who avoid all political discussions and engagements are essentially casting a vote for the status quo." It's impossible for me to read the gospels and ignore the political message that opposes racism, advocates for the poor, condemns oppression, and calls out corruption. They're centered on the story of Jesus Christ who challenged the religious and political authorities of his day and was executed as part of a larger and deeply political conflict.

Those same gospels also keep me from being wholeheartedly devoted to any party ideology or human institution. Being political and being partisan are not the same thing. I believe that the only thing that will heal the brokenness in our world is God's grace, not a political party or a certain political ideology. Socialism, capitalism, the Democratic Party, the Republican Party, libertarianism, none of them have the power to save us.

One of the themes we've come back to again and again at St. John's is that "God's love refuses to be kept in a box..." God's love does not conform to any specific political ideology or party platform. It's important for us to speak out on the issues that our country and society face—immigration, socioeconomic and racial inequity, famine and violence around the world—and it's important to vote. The Holy Spirit moves through our voices and votes. At the same time, let's not conflate our preferred party and the Kingdom of God, or hold any human institution above the love of God that breaks all borders and exceeds the limits of our imagination. That love that breathed our world into being and is calling all of us—Republican or Democrat, indigenous or immigrant, Episcopalian or not—back to God and into one human family.

CONNECTED IN CHRIST CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

Sunday's festive kickoff for the St. John's Capital Campaign was well attended, but this is just the beginning!



We ate a delicious catered breakfast while our Senior Warden John Tabor outlined the three major components of the proposed Projects that our campaign supports.

These are a renovation of Thaxter Hall, improved systems in the sanctuary (roofing, electrical & plumbing), and the construction of a connector between the two buildings.

After both services, parishioners formed a human chain on the perimeter of the proposed connector space between Thaxter Hall and the church. This helped people envision the size and scope of the project.



A Thank-You from the Capital Campaign Chairs



Our three-part project has generated a campaign goal of \$1.58 million with a stretch goal of \$2.1 million to include an elevator. Our campaign team announced that the quiet phase, which was conducted through the summer and concluded on October 21st, yielded 40 pledges for a dollar amount of \$968,000, or 61% of our goal.

Phase 2 of the campaign has begun with the Kickoff event and will involve 40 canvassers made up of parishioners and clergy, canvassing roughly 168 members of our community. We hope to conclude phase 2 by Thanksgiving. If you receive a call, know that the caller is generously volunteering her or his time to talk with you about our shared love of St. John's and the need to improve our buildings by making them safer, more attractive, efficient and accessible to all. We wish you enjoyable conversations that will enhance our connectedness to each other as a community, while helping us accomplish the worthy goal to improve the condition of our buildings so that they reflect the quality of our vibrant programs.

Being the People of God: A two-part series on the fundamentals of faith


